A Letter From

Laura



People are always surprised when I tell them that January is the worst month in church life. It's when the people who have held it together for the holidays fall apart and need the most support. In the last four weeks I have been in extensive conversations with folks around two suicides. And those conversations are never closed—new moments of grief come in the most surprising ways to those of us who live past the moment a family member takes his or her own life.

And since we operate on a calendar year, we need to close books and open new ones when we begin 2012. This year we've added the transition to using new software since the Session blessed us by investing in a new computer system for the office in the fall. We thought long and hard before spending the money, but knew we were close to the old system from 2004 crashing at any time and didn't want to think what emergency recovery would look like. We've never had functional church software before, so it's exciting to think of the efficiencies that are coming....but it's still work to get fully operational. Kristen has been squeezing in her training modules in the midst of preparing the Annual Report, updating all the records as officers rotate in and out of office, updating the church phone directory, (they will be available 2/5) and doing her usual work load.

The Deacons met for their first organizational meeting on 1/22 after worship. The Session is now commissioning Deacons annually rather than the congregation electing them to sit on a board for three year terms. The best part of the change is asking people to serve out of their strengths (just like we do everywhere else in the work of the church). The energy in the room as they brainstormed and divvied up the tasks they will focus on for the year was wonderful! We would have probably gone on talking for another hour but suddenly realized that the husbands who had made the mistake of ride sharing to church that morning probably were very ready to get home (they were).

Thank God everything does not change at once! I'm especially grateful as we move into 2012 that areas of strength: mission, education, worship, Trustees—can be counted on to continue their fine work. That will leave us some time to prepare for our 75th birthday party on June 10, 2012. Tracy Oprea has volunteered to head up the committee for the celebration, and is looking for help. And even though we've had the June 10th date before us for a while, all of a sudden it seems close with these other things in the schedule:

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on 2/22 which begins our series of Soup and Study with our sister congregations. Saturday Nyte Live returns better than ever on Saturday March 3rd. Jamie Milton's ordination service will be co-hosted by Hobart, his home congregation and FPCH in our building on Sunday March 18th at 2:00 CDT. Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday, 4/1 and crescendos to Easter 4/8 and then we get to load up the stage for the RUMMAGE Sale either the week of April 15th or April 29th—receive our Confirmands and then, by gosh, we'll be 75! Wow.

We need your help getting ready. While I've already invited Leroy Fassett, Linda Skaggs, Jean Marshall Stafford and Frank Vardeman to join us on June 10th, we'd like to send out an invitation to folks once part of FPCH and now scattered to other places. Can you help us by giving us names & addresses of those you've kept up with that would want to know about our 75th birthday? We'd like all that information by the end of February. Thank you! And hold onto your hats and join the fun as we thrive at 75.

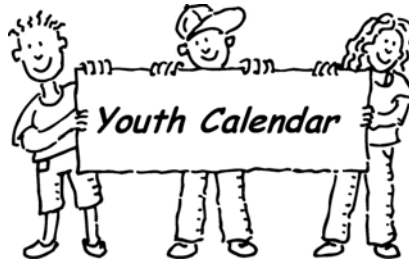

Wisdom from Loren Mead

Second in a three part series

From *Transforming Congregations for the Future*:

Against this background, the fact that our churches and the congregations that make them up are in trouble is a concern not just to the religious community. It is a matter of concern for the health of the society itself.

In this book, I contend that the storm buffeting the churches is very serious indeed. Much more serious than we have admitted to ourselves, and much more serious than our leaders have yet comprehended. The problems are not minor, calling for adjustments or corrections. They are problems that go to the roots of our institutions themselves. What I am describing here is not something we will fix. It is a state of existence in which we must learn to live even as we seek new directions for faithful response.

God calls us to a daunting task: to take those structures and those resources of faith and re-present them in forms that will carry them into the next century. I am astonished that God would invite us into such a task of co-creation. God obviously sees potential in us that we have a hard time accepting. And I believe that potential can be approached only as we in our differences enter into dialogue with each other. This book is my attempt to work at that task.

If I am right, we do not need a new set of programs. We need churches with a new consciousness of themselves and their task. The structures we have inherited have shown little capacity for such radical rethinking of their identity.

We have invented an enormously expensive form of professional theological education, the graduates of which are priced out of the financial reach of more and more congregations. We are not alone in this. Other professions (legal and medical, to name but two) have developed similar overcapacity for training. My crystal ball does not tell me what might happen in this realm, but I note it as an important worry for us all. Whenever there is such an excess of capacity for training in comparison with the market for services, there is cause for concern.

If the churches are in the middle of stormy times, facing perhaps unprecedented challenges over the next few generations, it is important that we be clear about what we need our congregations to be. If we are to transform the congregations, we first need to get clear about why we need them and what we need them to be for us. Earlier generations had assumptions about what congregations were. Those assumptions worked for hundreds of years, helping Christian men and women carry out what they understood mission to be in their time. Those assumptions led to the establishment of institutions and structures in addition to congregations, all shaped by the church's concern to build Christendom. Those assumptions no longer work in our times.

I think the task of the local congregation is to help ordinary people become engaged in that mystery, people willing to make the leap from the known to the unknown as Peter did; people who act on the basis of the new society, who claim the power of that kingdom, who then act for peace and justice and love and healing. The congregation's task is to call that faith forth in us and send us to act with no positive assurance that anything at all will happen.

In all the complexities of history, in all the encounters with organizational realities, in all the theological debates and philosophical analyses, I think we have lost sight of that simple focus of faith. I have no idea if congregations will grow or decline if they act on that focus, and frankly I don't (care). But I know they will lose their soul if they don't. That part is simple.

Wisdom from Loren Mead Cont'd

How to do it is not.

The first task in our transformation is the rebuilding of the city wall. The city wall of Jerusalem distinguished what was inside the city from what was outside. It helped the city establish its identity. So for us in our congregational life. We must clarify what makes us different, so that we can undertake our vocation as apostles. This requires us to establish the authenticity and distinctiveness of our congregations so that we live visibly in our faith, shaped by the biblical heritage, not by the least common denominator of local values and morality. We must build congregations where people know and follow Jesus, not the latest polls.

Intellectualization of faith

When I hear people talk about what is wrong with organized religion, or why their mainline churches are failing, I hear about bad music, inept clergy, mean congregations, and preoccupation with institutional maintenance. I almost never hear about the intellectualization of faith, which strikes me as a far greater danger than anything else on the list. In an age of information overload, when a vast variety of media delivers news faster than most of us can digest--when many of us have at least two email addresses, two telephone numbers, and one fax number--the last thing any of us needs is more information about God. We need the practice of incarnation, by which God saves the lives of those who intellectual assent has turned as dry as dust, who have run frighteningly low on the bread of life, who are dying to know God in their bodies. Not more about God. More God.

TREE OF WARMTH

Thank you to everyone who contributed to the 2011 "Tree of Warmth". We collected nearly 300 hats, gloves/mittens, scarves, ear warmers and socks, which also included 20 handmade items. The donations went to Fair Haven, Haven House & Love INC. We also want to thank Salon Platinum of Schererville, owned by Rose Peters (daughter of Kathy Parker) and Vanessa Farr who donated a very large bag of items to our Tree. Imagine all the children and adults our very generous Congregation along with Salon Platinum has helped to keep warm this winter.

SALVATION ARMY BELL RINGING

As a part of creating active service opportunities for the congregation of FPCH, the Ministry of Mission once again headed up the "ringing of the bells" by gathering FPCH volunteers to work for the Salvation Army's annual Red Kettle Campaign. This year our volunteers put in a total of 144 hours at the kettles. More than 60% of our regular worship attendees signed up for an opportunity to help with 71% of those choosing to ring more than once. The number of multiple hour ringers is particularly gratifying since it is an increase of more than 10 percent over last year and a truly significant indication of the FPCH congregation's commitment to helping those less fortunate. All of those efforts resulted in the cost free collection of \$4,589.95 (a \$303.76 increase from 2010's total) for the good work of the Salvation Army.

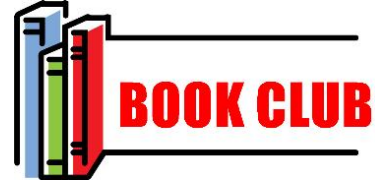
GOD'S FOOD PANTRY

Our former MTS student, Jamie Milton, has received an invitation from the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) of the First Presbyterian Church of Mineral Ridge, OH (in the Youngstown area) to candidate – which means that he and Katie will spend the weekend of Feb. 18 and 19 in Mineral Ridge and on the Sunday morning, he will preach and lead worship and the congregation will vote on whether to elect him as their Pastor on Sunday. We already know how that vote will go!

The way being clear (just means all the ducks are lined up), Jamie will be examined for ordination at the Eastminster Presbytery Assembly on Tuesday, March 13th. It is expected that Eastminster Presbytery, which would *normally* ordain and install Jamie, will request that Wabash Valley Presbytery ordain Jamie on their behalf. Talk about everything coming together at the right time! I don't know anyone who has had the privilege of presiding as Moderator at the ordination service of a former student. I'm sure it's happened before but it is not common. It will be a thrilling day for all of us.
